



YOU gave him a way out of addiction and brokenness

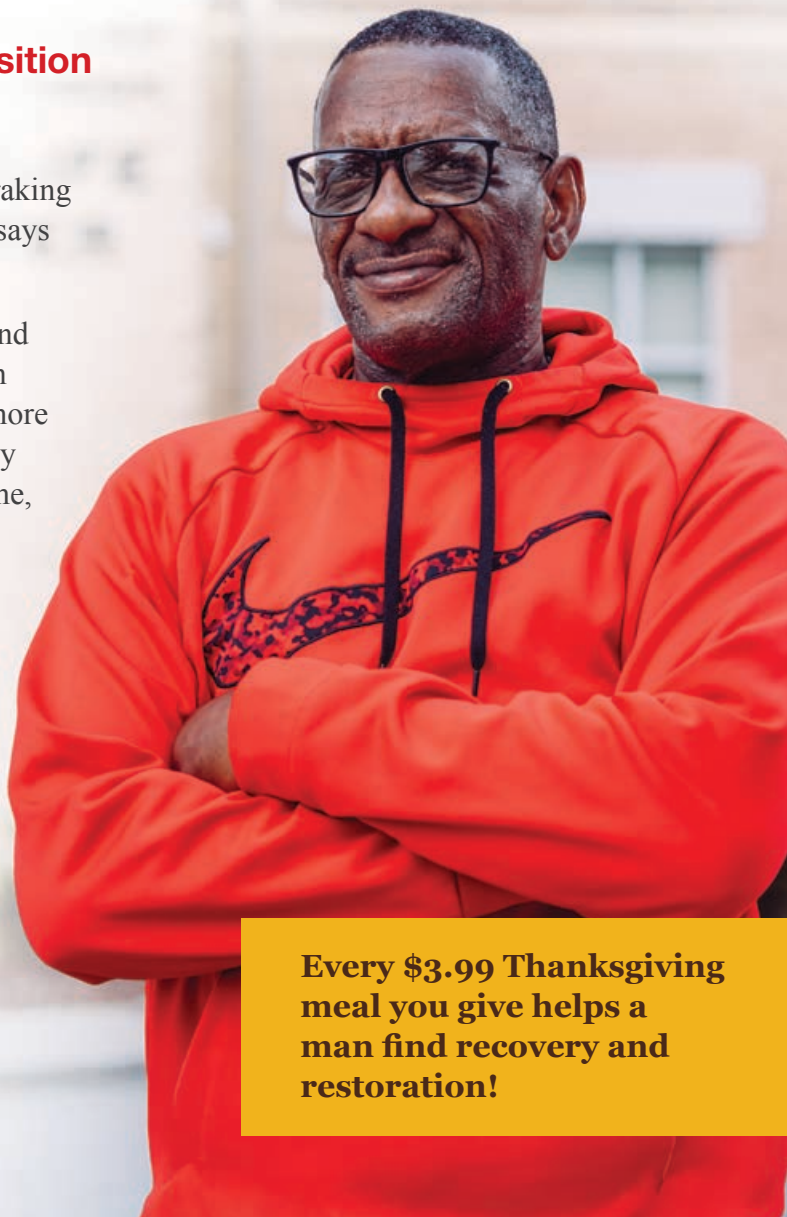
Timothy couldn't believe he was in this position — hungry, homeless, and . . .

. . . digging in a McDonald's dumpster. But there he was, raking through food scraps. "I was so hungry and at my lowest," says Timothy. "I felt like I was going to die."

A long road brought him to this rock-bottom moment behind the McDonald's. While on the surface, Timothy grew up in what looked like a "normal" home, the reality was much more complicated. "I was abused at an early age," he says. "They basically raised me middle class but yet abusive." Over time, especially with an overworked mom who wasn't around because she was trying to hold down two jobs, Timothy began to internalize a sense of worthlessness. "Low self-esteem became a part of my life. My mom told me, at one point, I wouldn't amount to anything. And she told me to strengthen me, she said. But to me, I think it turned me the opposite way."

Timothy hid all his pain behind sports through high school. Athletic talent wasn't the only thing he hid behind. He started drinking at just 15. Peer pressure, parties, and the pain of his past soon coaxed Timothy into drug use.

"I became angry all the time and started selling drugs on the side. Once I got on cocaine, my whole life changed."

Trapped in a cycle

A cycle began — in and out of jail, on and off the streets. Timothy longed to make something meaningful out of his mess. After a long stint of homelessness, he did. For 12 years, he was clean. And 11 of those years were spent married. But a separation led Timothy back to drinking and drugs.

“That left me homeless and living out of my car,” he says.

As he rummaged through the McDonald's dumpster, Timothy came to the end of himself. “I started crying out to God,” he says. “That drew me to get help.”

From death to life

Timothy had come to the Mission before, but he had never stayed long. This time was different. “Walking through the doors was like Heaven,” he says. “They

accepted me as I was. I knew I would be okay.”

As he journeyed through the Life Builders Program — and after, the long-term Transformers Program — Timothy learned how to conquer the giants in his life, build his character with Christ, and love himself as God loves him.

“I was spiritually dead when I got here,” says Timothy. “I’m alive again. I would be dead if I hadn’t come to the Mission.”

Because you give, Timothy received all the support he needed to step into lasting sobriety. He graduated from the Transformers Program, started barber school, and earned his Peer Support Certification to help other men who are struggling.

“I love who I’m becoming,” says Timothy. “I want to be used for God’s glory. It’s a powerful thing when you come here. It gives people a chance.”

At the Mission, that’s why we sit around the table with men in recovery on Thanksgiving. You and I could very well be in one of their seats. We’re all in need of a Savior.

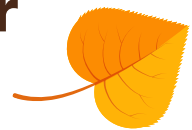
So yes, Thanksgiving is about a hot meal. But it’s also much more than that.
