

You lifted Derek out of the pit of addiction

Derek was lying on the floor of his brand-new home, paralyzed by shame . . .

“The devil was lashing me,” he says. “I was so hurt and depressed.” Because after a successful stretch of living a drug-free life, Derek found himself at the bottom of a pit again. *He wanted out.*

One knock on the door derailed everything . . .

After years of struggling with addiction, time behind bars, and a traumatic accident that put him in a coma, Derek was determined to build a meaningful life. And he did.

“I’d been through recovery, was getting myself together, and doing the things I knew I had to do,” says Derek.

The boxes were checked — Derek had a well-paying job, bought his own home, and was dreaming about going back to school for his master’s degree. But one knock on the door derailed everything.

“My cousin showed up at my house with alcohol,” says Derek. Derek fought off the temptation, saying no to his old way of life. But the very next weekend,

his cousin returned. "This time, I took a drink," says Derek.

His life spiraled fast. Derek found himself lying on his bedroom floor, back in the pit he had worked so hard to climb out of.

"I couldn't ease the emotional pain," says Derek. "It wasn't about the materialistic stuff for me. I could get that anytime. It was what I did. The failure I felt. I was stuck and grieving . . .

Trading shame for peace

Derek checked into a rehab program, still burdened with shame. But his shame couldn't stand when he came to the Winston-Salem Rescue Mission a month later.

"I've done a 180," says Derek. "I feel so good. So peaceful."

The journey has been long and challenging — but through your generosity, Derek found the steadfast support he needed to walk out his sobriety and purpose. Everything from the bed he sleeps in to

Christ-centered recovery care is provided because you give.

"God is teaching me to be still and listen. To slow down," says Derek. "I ask Him for peace. He shows me in His word, by waking me up in the morning, and by reminding me where I've been, where I'm at, and where I can go."

Derek still dreams of pursuing his master's degree — and because he's breaking free from addiction, it actually feels possible. "I'm looking forward to staying tied to God," says Derek. "He'll give me the understanding I need to keep going forward."
